



\*Please look over your fair book. We have added some new classes and deleted some from different departments. If you are a livestock exhibitor please take note of the pass system this year\*

\*Please note that "Fair Theme" appears in the classes. This is a special class and exhibitors in that class will receive double the premium award\*

1. PRE-REGISTRATION IS STRONGLY RECOMMENDED. If you bring items on the day of registration you will be charged a .50 cent service fee for each entry. Blank forms of entry are located in the back of this book, or if needed will be furnished by the fair upon application.

They are to be filled out by the exhibitors, giving: the name of the exhibitor, address, class department, and description of the articles or animal. ONE

EXHIBITOR NUMBER is assigned to be used by the exhibitor in any or all departments entered. The Fair Association will prepare a separate entry tag to be attached to each exhibit. All General Entries Must Be Brought To The Fairgrounds And Taken To The Appropriate Department(s) On Saturday July 26th Between 11:00 And 3:00 PM. (See Fair Schedule or Dept. 10 For Times Of 4-H and FFA Livestock Entries.) No Exceptions made. 2. All General Exhibits Must Be Removed From The Fairgrounds Between 11 AM And 1 PM On Sunday, Aug. 3rd. Any Article Not Removed By 2 PM Will Become The Property Of The Fair To Dispose Of As Deemed Fit. If you would like your vegetables or fruits back please make note on your exhibit form or be at the Fairgrounds by 10 AM on Aug.3rd. 3. All Exhibits. Unless Otherwise Stated. Must Be On Display For The Duration Of The Fair. Any **Exhibits Removed Before Being Instructed By** The Department Superintendent, Will Forfeit Their Premiums.

- **4.** Every care will be taken to protect the animals, food or articles exhibited from injury, but the Association will not in any way hold itself responsible for accidents, loss or damage by fire or theft, whatever may be the cause of the damage or loss sustained.
- **5.** No one article may receive two premiums. No entry for the same article will be made in more than one department. Every entry must have a number to correspond to the number in the premium list. (EXCEPTION: Department 10, 4-H and FFA exhibitors may also enter their animals only, in the open class if they pay the ENTRY FEE.)
- **6.** The Fair Board of Directors reserves the right to exclude from the grounds any article obnoxious, offensive, objectionable or repulsive in character. The Fair Board also reserves the right to remove an article that has been erected without their knowledge. These rules are established to ensure that the articles exhibited at the Schuylkill County Fair are suitable for a family audience.
- **7.** Articles exhibited, whether edible or not, must be respected as private property. Any person detected purloining or injuring them will be dealt with according to the law.
- 8. In cases where there is no competition judges may give an award such as they deem the exhibit worthy to receive. The same rule applies where there are fewer entries in any class than the number of premiums offered. The judges may, at their discretion, award a prize or prizes of such grade as the exhibit deserves.
- **9.** The Fair will award premiums according to the lists printed in each Department.
- **10.** The Fair Association reserves the right to limit the number of entries. ENTRIES CANNOT BE CHANGED AFTER THE CLOSING DATE.
- 11. Refunds Of Entry Fees Will Only Be Made For Exhibits That Were Pre-Registered For Departments 13, 14, and 17 But Which Were Not Suitable For Display At Fair Time Due To No Fault Of The Exhibitor. Refunds Will Be Made Only On Entry Day. 12. One exhibit entry per class per exhibitor.

- **13.** No classes will be added to the various departments.
- 14. In order to properly control security and maintain order during overnight hours of the Fair, anyone wishing to remain overnight to be with their exhibits (animals and midway) MUST register at the Fair Office and indicate the nights they intend to remain. Any youth under 18 MUST also have a special Parental Permission slip indicating all requested information and SIGNED by their parent. Anyone not registered with the Office by 8:00 PM will be asked by security to leave the grounds. Also, anyone not abiding with the overnight superintendent's regulations or the security officers will be asked to leave the grounds.
- **15.** If there are any questions regarding entry of exhibits to the Fair, all questions are to be directed to the appropriate superintendents, whose telephone numbers are listed with each department.

#### **ADVICE TO EXHIBITORS**

- 1. Make your entries early, either in person or by mail, and take your exhibits to the grounds at the time designated in the rules. Please do not remove them until the close of the Fair.
- Upon your arrival at the grounds with stock or other articles for exhibition, inquire for the superintendent of the department in which you are an exhibitor.
   They will direct you to the stall or space your stock or exhibits is to occupy.
- 3. Entries must be made in the name of a bona-fide owner. Violation of this rule will result in forfeiture.
- 4. If you desire any information in regards to the business of the exhibition, go to the superintendent of the department in which you are an exhibitor and they will gladly give you all the information needed.
- 5. The Superintendent in charge of the department will deal with false representation, interference or unsportsmanlike conduct by an exhibitor or their agent, where the exhibit is entered. There will be no appeal of this decision.
- 6. Protests against awards must be in writing indicating the reason. The protest must be filed with the **FARM** Secretary not later than the day after the award is made. Persons submitting a protest will be granted a hearing, if deemed necessary, by the Schuylkill County Fair Board of Directors.
- 7. Department Superintendents MAY enter exhibits in their own departments, but neither they or any other exhibitor may communicate with the judges during the time of determining the awards, except to answer questions posed by the judges.
- 8. By following these suggestions you will save yourself much disappointment and trouble. You will go home with a better feeling by making friends and by having contributed to the enjoyment of others.
- 9. Plan now for next year's Schuylkill County Fair. If you are planning to exhibit or would like to show animals at the next Fair you should plan early.

# ADDITIONAL RULES CONCERNING LIVESTOCK

1. Do not expect bedding to be provided. Exhibitor should expect to furnish grain, hay, bedding, and

care for animal.

- 2. Pets Will Not Be Permitted On The Grounds **Except For Those That Are Part Of An Approved** Exhibit Or Display; This does not apply to bonified service or therapeutic animals.
- 3. All livestock offered for show must have been the property of the exhibitor for a period of not less than 30 days. 4-H and FFA rules may be more stringent. Check with your Educator or Advisor.
- 4. \*\*\*PASSES: Passes will no longer be mailed to the exhibitor! Each exhibitor is responsible to locate either the livestock or dairy superintendent when they check-in fair week. The superintendent will provide the exhibitor and their family with individual and vehicle passes.

Each Livestock exhibitor will be issued 1 exhibitor pass/ wristband with 2 additional exhibitor passes/wristbands per family and 2 parking passes per family. Additional passes can be purchased at the Fair office at the cost of \$5 per week for a person pass and \$10 per week for a parking pass.

Holders of livestock passes will be admitted ONLY through the livestock gate. Livestock passes/wristband must be in Exhibitor or Exhibitor's helpers' possession at all times.

Superintendents, Security and Fair board members have a right to ask to see the pass and it must be produced without delay. If an individual is not in possession of their credentials and they are not easily producible, the individual will be escorted to the main entrance gate to pay regular admission price to the fairgrounds. All vehicles entering through the livestock gate must have a vehicle pass. Each and every occupant in the vehicle must have a personal Livestock pass/wristband. Any occupants of the vehicle who are not properly credentialed will be asked to vacate the vehicle at the checkpoint and will be sent to the main entrance to pay regular admission to the fairgrounds. All Livestock exhibitor vehicles will be requested to park in the livestock parking area.

NEW for 2014: In an effort to alleviate crowding in the parking area, all livestock haulers being left at the grounds during the Fair will be required to park in the expanded livestock parking area near the Museum. No haulers will be permitted to park in the Livestock parking/camping lot.

- 5. Any neglect of animal or animals during the week of the fair can result in an Exhibitor not receiving a premium check. This will be left up to the discretion of the superintendents.
- 6. CVI must be on the fairgrounds while the animal resides on the facility.

The following Animal Owner or Caretaker's Verification of Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship (VCPR) statement for the animals being exhibited must be included with a signature line on the fair registration form: I attest and affirm that a "veterinary client-patient relationship" - as that phrase is defined in the Animal Exhibition Sanitation Law found at 3 Pa.C.S.A. § 2501 et

#### seg. and any amendments thereto - exists with regard to any animals I will be exhibiting.

The Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture recommends that animals returning home from fairs be isolated from other members of the herd or flock for 2-4 weeks to help prevent the spread of disease. In addition to these animal health requirements, the Pennsylvania Department of Agriculture recommends that exhibitors of all animals, including those for commercial exhibit, discuss the health of their animals, including vaccine recommendations, with a veterinarian on a regular basis.

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#### Section 1: Pennsylvania Camelids: Requirements:

- 1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2014 is required.
- 2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI (the statement is pre-printed on the CVI).
- 3. Individual animal identification is required. ID options include:
- · Official ID. including:
- o An ISO-compliant 15-digit eartag (including RFID); or
- o A state-approved tattoo; or
- o An electronic implant device (the exhibitor must supply a reader); or
- o A USDA-issued metal ear tag. or
   On the AAI-13 (Certificate of Veterinary Inspection form obtained from the Department of Agriculture) accredited veterinarians simply need to:
- mark "Camelid" in box number 4;
- write the animal's color in box number 8;
- record date of birth in box number 10;
- record gender in box number 11; and
- record either "llama" or "alpaca" in box number 12.

\*In addition, veterinarians are encouraged to write down any distinguishing markings that are present on the animal. Questions regarding proper identification for camelids on Certificates of Veterinary Inspection for Pennsylvania fairs can be directed to Dr. Tom Alexander at 717-783-6851.

#### Section 2: Out of State Camelids: Requirements:

- 1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to the opening date of the exhibition is required. If an animal comes from a state in which Vesicular Stomatitis (VS) has been identified, or a bordering state, the CVI shall include a statement verifying that "all animals identified on this certificate of veterinary inspection have been examined and found to be free from Vesicular Stomatitis. During the past 90 days, these animals have neither been exposed to VS nor located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."
- 2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI (the statement is pre-printed
- 3. Identification Requirements: Individual official animal identification is required. Official ID includes:

- An ISO-compliant 15-digit eartag (including RFID); or
- · A state-registered tattoo; or
- An electronic implant device (the exhibitor must supply a reader); or
- A USDA-issued metal ear tag.
- 5. Testing: Brucellosis Requirements:
- All sexually intact camelids 12 months of age and older must be test negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation. The negative test results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative laboratory test report (a copy of the original lab report is acceptable).
- 6. Testing requirements: Tuberculosis:
- No test is required for animals originating from "Accredited Free" states or zones.
- All animals originating from states or zones designated "Modified Accredited Advanced" must be test negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation. The negative test results and dates of tests must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original report is acceptable).
- All animals originating from states or zones designated "Modified Accredited" must originate from herds in which all animals 12 months of age and older are test negative within the 12 months prior to the date of importation and the individual animals (all ages) to be imported are also test negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation and at least 60 days after the negative whole herd test was completed. The negative test results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original test report is acceptable).

#### Section 3: Pennsylvania Cattle: Requirements:

- 1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2014 is required.
- 2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI (the statement is pre-printed on the CVI)
- 3. Individual official animal identification is required. Official ID includes:
- A USDA-issued metal eartag; or
- A breed registration tattoo if the tattoo is legible and the animal is accompanied by a copy of the registration certificate; or
- A breed registration eartag if the animal is accompanied by a copy of the registration certificate; or
- An ISO-compliant 15-digit eartag (including RFID).
- 5. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is required for animals 3 months of age and older (market cattle are exempt from this vaccination requirement). All vaccine label directions must be followed, and all rabies vaccinated cattle must be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate or the vaccination information must be included on the CVI. If a rabies vaccination certificate is provided, the certificate must contain legible name and contact information of the veterinarian who administered the vaccine and the veterinarian's signature. A copy of the rabies vaccination certificate is acceptable.

## Section 4: Out of State Cattle: Requirements:

- 1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 60 days prior to the opening date of the exhibition is required. If an animal comes from a state in which Vesicular Stomatitis (VS) has been identified, or a bordering state, the CVI shall include a statement verifying that "all animals identified on this certificate of veterinary inspection have been examined and found to be free from Vesicular Stomatitis. During the past 90 days, these animals have neither been exposed to VS nor located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."
- 2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI (the statement is pre-printed on the CVI).
- 3. Individual official animal identification is required. Official ID includes:
- A USDA-issued metal eartag; or
- A breed registration tattoo if the tattoo is legible and the animal is accompanied by a copy of the registration certificate; or
- A breed registration eartag if the animal is accompanied by a copy of the registration certificate; or

- An ISO-compliant 15-digit eartag (including RFID).
- 5. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is required for animals 3 months of age and older (market cattle are exempt from this vaccination requirement). All vaccine label directions must be followed, and all rabies vaccinated cattle must be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate or the vaccination information must be included on the CVI. If a rabies vaccination certificate is provided, the certificate must contain legible name and contact information of the veterinarian who administered the vaccine and the veterinarian's signature. A copy of the rabies vaccination certificate is acceptable.
- 6. Testing: Brucellosis Requirements:
- No test is required for exhibition animals which originate from a Brucellosis-free state or are members of a Certified Brucellosis-free Herd.
- Test eligible animals (unvaccinated animals over 8 months (269 days of age) and all animals over 14 months (449 days of age)) originating from Brucellosis Class A, B and C states shall be Brucellosis test negative within 60 days of the opening date of the show. The negative test results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative laboratory test report (a copy of the original lab report is acceptable)
- An approved laboratory in the state of origin or Canada shall conduct an official blood test for brucellosis, and the imported test-eligible animals shall be negative on an officially approved brucellosis test.
- 7. Testing: Tuberculosis Requirements:
- No test is required for animals originating from "Accredited Free" states or zones.
- All animals originating from states or zones designated "Modified Accredited Advanced" must be test negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation. The negative test results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original report is acceptable).
- All animals originating from states or zones designated "Modified Accredited" must originate from herds in which all animals 12 months of age and older are test negative within the 12 months prior to the date of importation; and the individual animals to be imported (all ages) are test negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation and at least 60 days after the negative whole herd test. The negative test results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original test report is acceptable).

#### Section 7: Dogs for Exhibition: Requirements:

- 1. A current rabies vaccination is required for all exhibition dogs three months of age and older. All vaccine label directions must be followed.
- 2. All rabies-vaccinated dogs must be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate. The certificate must contain legible name, contact information, and signature of the veterinarian who administered the vaccine. A copy of the rabies vaccination certificate is acceptable.
- 3. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases.
- 4. An Animal Owner or Caretaker's Verification of Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship (VCPR) statement for the animals being exhibited must be included on the fair registration form.

#### Section 8: Pennsylvania Equine Animals: Requirements:

- 1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2014 is required.
- 2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI (the statement is pre-printed on the CVI).
- 3. An Animal Owner or Caretaker's Verification of Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship (VCPR) statement for the animals being exhibited must be included on the fair registration form. 4. All equine animals must be test negative for EIA by an
- official test within the 12 months prior to the opening date of the exhibition. Laboratory test results must accompany each animal to its final destination (a copy of the original lab report is acceptable). Foals less than six months of age accompanied by a dam which meets the above requirements are exempt from EIA

testing requirements. If the foal is not accompanied by the dam, a copy of the dam's test results must accompany the foal to its final destination.

5. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is required for animals three months of age and older. However, if a mare was currently vaccinated against rabies when she foaled, the foal is not required to be vaccinated until six months of age, with a second vaccination administered two-four weeks later. All vaccine label directions must be followed, and all rabies vaccinated equine animals must be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate or the vaccination information must be included on the CVI. The certificate must contain legible name and contact information of the veterinarian who administered the vaccine and the veterinarian's signature. A copy of the original rabies vaccination certificate is acceptable.

#### Section 9: Out of State Equine Animals: Requirements:

- 1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to the opening date of the exhibition is required. If an animal comes from a state in which Vesicular Stomatitis (VS) has been identified, or a bordering state, the CVI shall include a statement verifying that "all animals identified on this certificate of veterinary inspection have been examined and found to be free from Vesicular Stomatitis. During the past 90 days, these animals have neither been exposed to VS nor located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."
- 2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI (the statement is pre-printed on the CVI).
- 3. All equine animals must be test negative for EIA by an official test within the 12 months prior to the opening date of the exhibition. Laboratory test results must accompany each animal to its final destination (a copy of the original lab report is acceptable). Foals less than six months of age accompanied by a dam which meets the above requirements are exempt from EIA testing requirements. If the foal is not accompanied by the dam, a copy of the dam's test results must accompany the foal to its final destination.
- 5. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is required for animals three months of age and older. However, if a mare was currently vaccinated against rabies when she foaled, the foal is not required to be vaccinated until six months of age, with a second vaccination administered two-four weeks later. All vaccine label directions must be followed, and all rabies vaccinated equine animals must be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate or the vaccination information must be included on the CVI. The certificate must contain legible name and contact information of the veterinarian who administered the vaccine and the veterinarian's signature. A copy of the original rabies vaccination certificate is acceptable. 6. If an equine animal has resided in which Piroplasmosis has been identified within the past five years for a cumulative total of 30 days or more within the six months preceding the date of entry into the Commonwealth, that animal must be test negative for Piroplasmosis on a competitive enzyme linked immunosorbent assay (c-ELISA) test, or a Department approved equivalent test, with the test occurring within the 30 days preceding entry into Pennsylvania. The written laboratory test report, confirming compliance with the requirement described above, shall accompany the equine animal in transit to a destination within the Commonwealth of Pennsylvania; and the date of test and the test results shall be written on the Certificate of Veterinary Inspection.

#### Section 10: Pennsylvania Goats: Requirements:

- 1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May1, 2014 is required.
- 2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI (the statement is pre-printed on the CVI).
- 3. Individual official animal identification is required. Official ID includes:
- An official USDA scrapie eartag. Contact the USDA to obtain scrapie eartags at 1-866-873-2824, weekdays from 9 AM to 5 PM. Your order may take several weeks for processing, so order tags early; or
- An ISO-compliant 15-digit eartag (including RFID); or
- A USDA-approved custom scrapie eartag; or

- A USDA-approved scrapie tattoo. Goats with an official scrapie tattoo must also have a unique individual animal ID (tattoo) to meet the scrapie ID requirement; or
- Goats having a breed registration tattoo and accompanied by a registration certificate are exempt from the scrapie ID requirement if the tattoo is legible and a registration certificate (copy acceptable) or a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection which lists the tattoo and registry accompanies the animal at all times during transport from the premises of birth.

#### Section 11: Out of State Goats: Requirements:

- 1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 60 days prior to the opening date of the exhibition is required. If an animal comes from a state in which Vesicular Stomatitis (VS) has been identified, or a bordering state, the CVI shall include a statement verifying that "all animals identified on this certificate of veterinary inspection have been examined and found to be free from Vesicular Stomatitis (VS). During the past 90 days, these animals have neither been exposed to VS nor located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."
- 2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI (the statement is pre-printed on the CVI).
- 3. Individual official animal identification is required. Official ID includes:

An official USDA scrapie eartag. Contact the USDA to obtain scrapie eartags at 1-866-873-2824, weekdays from 9 AM to 5 PM. Your order may take several weeks for processing, so order tags early; or

- An ISO-compliant 15-digit eartag (including RFID); or
- A USDA-approved custom scrapie eartag; or
- A USDA-approved scrapie tattoo. Goats with an official scrapie tattoo must also have a unique individual animal ID (tattoo) to meet the scrapie ID requirement; or
- Goats having a breed registration tattoo and accompanied by a registration certificate are exempt from the scrapie ID requirement if the tattoo is legible and a registration certificate (copy acceptable) or a Certificate of Veterinary Inspection which lists the tattoo and registry accompanies the animal at all times during transport from the premises of birth.
- 5. Testing requirements: Tuberculosis:
- No test is required for animals originating from "Accredited Free" states or zones.
- All animals originating from states or zones designated "Modified Accredited Advanced" must be test negative within the 60 days prior to importation. The negative test results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original report is acceptable).
- All animals originating from states or zones designated "Modified Accredited" must originate from herds in which all animals 12 months of age and older have tested negative within the 12 months prior to the date of importation; and the individual animals (all ages) to be imported have also tested negative within the 60 days prior to the date of importation and at least 60 days after the negative whole herd test was completed. The negative test results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative test report (a copy of the original test report is acceptable).

# Section 12: Pennsylvania Poultry, Waterfowl, Upland Game Birds, Ratites, and Pigeons: Requirements:

- 1. All Pennsylvania poultry, waterfowl, upland game birds, and pigeons entering an exhibition must bear a unique individual identification leg band (official state-issued leg bands are not required). Ratites must be identified with a neck band or an electronic implant device (the exhibitor must supply a reader).
- 2. An owner-endorsed health certificate must accompany all Pennsylvania poultry, waterfowl, upland game birds, ratites, and pigeons, and must include the following:
  - Name and location of exhibition; and
  - Name, address, and telephone number of the owner; and
  - A statement that their entries and their flock of origin are free of evidence of contagious diseases; and
  - Owner signature and date of that signature.
- 3. An Animal Owner or Caretaker's Verification of Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship (VCPR) statement for the animals being exhibited must be included on the fair registration form.

- Avian Influenza Clean Testing and Verification (all samples must be collected by a Certified Poultry Technician or an Accredited Veterinarian).
- All poultry, waterfowl, upland game birds, and ratites, (*pigeons excluded*) for exhibition must originate from a flock in good standing in the Pennsylvania Avian Influenza Monitored Flock program, or from a flock in good standing in the NPIP Avian Influenza Clean program (the flock must be participating in the NPIP AI Clean program-it is not considered to be a clean flock if only originating from a clean breeder flock or hatchery), and the birds must be accompanied by the most recent test report (copy acceptable). Test results must be negative. The NPIP or AI Mon. flock number must be noted on the report;
- The birds must originate from a flock in which a minimum of 30 birds, 3 weeks of age or older, were tested for avian influenza within the 6 months prior to opening date of the exhibition and the birds must be accompanied by the most recent test report (copy acceptable). Test results must be negative. If there are fewer than 30 birds in the flock, test all birds. For ducks and geese, cloacal swab samples must be collected for testing, and the swabs may be tested using virus isolation (ducks and geese) or PCR (domestic ducks only) techniques.

  5. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean Testing and Verification (pigeons/doves and waterfowl excluded). (All samples must be collected by a Certified Poultry Technician or an Accredited Veterinarian).
- All poultry, upland game birds, and ratites (pigeons/doves and waterfowl excluded) must originate from a flock in good standing in the NPIP Pullorum-Typhoid Clean Program or from a flock in good standing in the PA Pullorum Equivalent Program and the birds must be accompanied by the most recent test report (copy acceptable). Test results must be negative. If the rapid whole blood plate agglutination test was done, the most recent 9-2 or state equivalent form must accompany the birds (copy acceptable). Test results must be negative. If birds are less than one year of age and originate from an NPIP Clean hatchery, they do not have to be tested for pullorum if they are accompanied by a 9-3 form from that hatchery and any additions to the flock were also from NPIP Clean sources. The NPIP number must be noted on the report for NPIP Pullorum-Typhoid Clean flocks; OR
- All individual birds (pigeons/doves and waterfowl excluded) for exhibition (maximum of 300) must have had a pullorum-typhoid test within the 90 days prior to the opening date of the exhibition. The birds must be accompanied by the most recent test report or state quivalent form for the rapid test (copies acceptable). Test results must be negative. The following age restrictions apply to comply with NPIP standards:
- •Chickens shall be tested at 4 months of age or older.
- •Turkeys shall be tested at 12 weeks of age or older.
- •Game birds shall be tested at 4 months of age or older, or upon sexual maturity, whichever comes first.
- •Ratites shall be tested at 12 months of age or older.
- •All birds not meeting these age restrictions at the time of sampling are exempt from pullorum testing requirements

# Section 13: Out of State Poultry, Waterfowl, Upland Game Birds, Ratites, and Pigeons: Requirements:

- 1. All poultry, waterfowl, upland game birds, and pigeons entering an exhibition must bear an individual identification leg band. Ratites must be identified with a neck band or an electronic implant device (the exhibitor must supply a reader)
- exhibitor must supply a reader).

  2. An owner-endorsed health certificate must accompany all out of state poultry, waterfowl, upland game birds, ratites, and pigeons, and must include the following:
- . Name and location of exhibition; and
- Name, address, and telephone number of the owner; and
- A statement that their entries and their flock of origin are free of evidence of contagious diseases; and
- Owner signature and date of that signature.
- 3. An Animal Owner or Caretaker's Verification of Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship (VCPR) statement for the animals being exhibited must be included on the fair registration form.
- 4. Avian Influenza Clean Testing and Verification (all samples must be collected bya Certified Poultry Technician or an Accredited Veterinarian. Poultry, waterfowl, upland game birds, and ratites (pigeons/doves excluded) shall only be allowed into the Commonwealth and the exhibition after meeting one of the following requirements:

The birds originate from a flock in good standing in the NPIP Avian Influenza Clean program (the flock must be participating in the NPIP AI Clean program it is not considered to be a clean flock if only originating from a clean breeder flock or hatchery) and the shipment is accompanied by a USDA form 9-3 or equivalent Department-approved form;

OR

The birds originate from a flock that participates in an equivalent avian influenza monitoring program and the shipment is accompanied by a document from the state, nation, or province of origin indicating participation;

. OR

The birds originate from a flock in which a minimum of 30 birds, 3 weeks of age or older, were tested negative for avian influenza within the 30 days prior to the date of importation and the birds must be accompanied by the most recent test report (copy acceptable). Test results must be negative. If there are fewer than 30 birds in the flock, test all birds.

For ducks and geese, cloacal swab samples must be collected for testing, and the swabs may be tested using virus isolation (ducks and geese) or PCR (domestic ducks only) techniques.

5. Pullorum-Typhoid Clean Testing and Verification (pigeons/doves Excluded). (All samples must be collected by a Certified Poultry Technician or an Accredited Veterinarian):

All poultry, upland game birds, and ratites (pigeons/doves excluded) must come from NPIP Pullorum-Typhoid Clean flocks and the birds must be accompanied by a USDA form 9-3 or equivalent Department -approved form; OR

All individual birds (pigeons/doves excluded) for exhibition (maximum of 300) must have had a negative pullorum-typhoid test within the 30 days prior to the date of importation. The birds must be accompanied by the most recent test report (copy acceptable). Test results must be negative. If the rapid whole-blood plate agglutination test was done, the most recent 9-2 form must accompany the birds (copy acceptable). Test results must be negative. If birds are less than one year of age and originate from an NPIP Clean hatchery, they do not have to be tested for pullorum if they are accompanied by a 9-3 form from that hatchery and any additions to the flock were also from NPIP Clean sources. The following age restrictions apply to comply with NPIP standards:

Chickens shall be tested at 4 months of age or older.

Turkeys shall be tested at 12 weeks of age or older.

Game birds and waterfowl shall be tested at 4 months of age or older, or upon sexual maturity, whichever comes first.

Ratites shall be tested at 12 months of age or older.

All birds not meeting these age restrictions at the time of sampling Must come from a flock in which all of the eligible birds in the flock (up to 300) have been test negative within the 90 days prior to the date of importation.

#### Section 14: Pennsylvania Rabbits: Requirements:

- 1. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases.
- 2. An Animal Owner or Caretaker's Verification of Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship (VCPR) statement for the animals being exhibited must be included on the fair registration form.

## Section 15: Out of State Rabbits: Requirements:

- 1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 60 days prior to the opening date of the exhibition is required.
- 2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI (the statement is pre-printed on the CVI).

#### Section 16: Pennsylvania Sheep: Requirements:

- 1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2014 is required.
- 2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI (the statement is pre-printed on the CVI)
- 3. Individual official USDA scrapie animal identification is required. Official scrapie ID includes:
- An official USDA scrapie eartag. Contact the USDA to obtain scrapie eartags at 1-866-873-2824, weekdays from 9 AM to 5 PM. Your order may take several weeks for processing, so order tags early; or
- A USDA-approved custom scrapie eartag; or

- A USDA-approved scrapie tattoo with individual animal ID (tattoo); or
- An ISO-compliant 15-digit eartag (including RFID).
- 4. A current rabies vaccination administered by a licensed veterinarian is required for animals 3 months of age and older (market sheep are exempt from this vaccination requirement). All vaccine label directions must be followed, and all rabies vaccinated sheep must be accompanied by a rabies vaccination certificate or the vaccination information must be included on the CVI. If a rabies vaccination certificate is provided, the certificate must contain legible name and contact information of the veterinarian who administered the vaccine and the veterinarian's signature. A copy of the rabies vaccination certificate is acceptable.

## Section 17: Out of State Sheep: Requirements:

- 1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 60 days prior to the opening date of the exhibition is required. If an animal comes from a state in which Vesicular Stomatitis (VS) has been identified, or a bordering state, the CVI shall include a statement verifying that "all animals identified on this certificate of veterinary inspection have been examined and found to be free from Vesicular Stomatitis. During the past 90 days, these animals have neither been exposed to VS nor located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."
- All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI (the statement is pre-printed on the CVI).
- Individual official USDA scrapie animal identification is required.
   Official scrapie ID includes:
- An official USDA scrapie eartag. Contact the USDA to obtain scrapie eartags at 1-866-873-2824, weekdays from 9 AM to 5 PM. Your order may take several weeks for processing, so order tags early; or
- · A USDA-approved custom scrapie eartag; or
- A USDA-approved scrapie tattoo with individual animal ID (tattoo); or

#### Section 18: Pennsylvania Swine: Requirements:

- A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued after May 1, 2014 is required.
- 2. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI (the statement is pre-printed on the CVI).
- 3. Individual animal ID is required. ID options include the following:
- A form of official ID, including:
- o A herd tattoo in combination with an ear notch; or
- o A USDA-issued metal ear tag; or
- o An ISO-compliant 15-digit eartag (including RFID); or
- · A plastic stamped ear tag (market hogs only).

#### Section 19: Out of State Swine: Requirements:

- 1. A Certificate of Veterinary Inspection (CVI) issued within the 30 days prior to the opening date of the exhibition is required. The CVI shall include a statement verifying that the swine have not been fed raw garbage.
- 2. If an animal comes from a state in which Vesicular Stomatitis (VS) has been identified, or a bordering state, the CVI shall include a statement verifying that "all animals identified on this certificate of veterinary inspection have been examined and found to be free from Vesicular Stomatitis. During the past 90 days, these animals have neither been exposed to VS nor located within 10 miles of a site where VS has been diagnosed."
- 3. All animals must be free of infectious and contagious diseases and a statement of this is required on the CVI (the statement is pre-printed on the CVI).
- 4. Individual official animal identification is required. Official ID

#### includes:

- A herd tattoo in combination with an ear notch; or
- · A USDA-issued metal ear tag; or
- An ISO-compliant 15-digit eartag (including RFID).
- 5. Brucellosis Testing Requirements:
- No brucellosis test is required if the animal originates from a Validated Brucellosis-free Herd. If from a Validated Herd, the herd number and date of last test must be included on the CVI.
- If not originating from a Validated Herd, out of state swine must be negative to an official brucellosis test within the 30 days prior to the opening date of the exhibition, and the negative results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal must be accompanied by a negative laboratory test report (a copy of the original lab report is acceptable).
- 6. Pseudorabies Testing Requirements:
- No pseudorabies test is required if the animal originates from a Qualified Pseudorabies-negative Herd. A Qualified Pseudorabies-negative Herd shall not be construed to mean every swine herd from a Stage V state, but only those herds in compliance with individual herd testing plans. If from a Qualified Herd, the herd number and date of last test must be included on the CVI.
- If not originating from a Qualified Herd, out of state swine
  must be negative to an official pseudorabies test within the 30
  days prior to the opening date of the exhibition, and the negative
  results and date of test must be included on the CVI or the animal
  must be accompanied by a negative laboratory test report (a copy
  of the original lab report is acceptable).

Eligibility: This department is limited to members of Schuylkill County 4-H Clubs and FFA Chapters. **The total number of market animals that can be shown and sold is 4**, with the following limits for each species:

4-H club members must have passed their 5<sup>th</sup> birthday as of January 1<sup>st</sup> of the current year and must not have passed their 18<sup>th</sup> birthday as of January 1<sup>st</sup> of the current year in order to be members of 4-H. In order to exhibit livestock, dairy or equine animals, members must be between the ages of 8-18 as of January 1<sup>st</sup>. Members 5-7 should direct their attention to the General 4-H Exhibit section of the 4-H and FFA Department. All members must be registered with the extension office by April 15<sup>th</sup> for returning members and June 1<sup>st</sup> for new members carrying a project in the field that they wish to enter an exhibit. The Schuylkill County 4-H Round-Up is held in conjunction with the Schuylkill County Fair.

FFA members may retain active membership until November 30<sup>th</sup>, following the fourth national FFA convention after graduation from high school. FFA members must also have completed all required activities and paid dues in order to be eligible to have entries in any areas where they are carrying an approved record book. All entries must have the approval of the respective advisors of the exhibitor. All exhibitors must specify either 4-H or FFA on their entry forms.

#### **RULES**

1. Any person wishing to exhibit in this area must meet the above eligibility requirements. Dept. 10 livestock and general exhibit entrants should complete the entry forms found in the fair book and return them to the extension office by July 1<sup>st</sup>. Horse exhibitors will receive forms from the extension office. Horse entry forms are due June 1<sup>st</sup> to the extension office. A Schuylkill County 4-H'er that is taking a Schuylkill County project must complete their project requirements and show/exhibit their project at the Schuylkill County Round-up if he/she wants to be considered a Schuylkill County 4-H member

- 2. The livestock entry fee is \$2.00 per animal exhibited. This includes rabbits and dairy cattle.
- 3. PREMIUMS: Premiums will not be awarded in livestock classes; however, premiums for Showmanship, Fitting and Breeding classes will be awarded the following:

- 4. All 4-H and FFA animals must arrive before 3 PM Sunday of Fair week, except beef animals being hauled on a dairy cattle truck. They must be on the fairgrounds no later than 1 PM Monday. You must notify the extension office if you are arriving Monday. There are unloading times for livestock again this year! Animals will be allowed on the fairgrounds between 10 AM-6 PM Saturday. They will also be allowed to arrive only between 12 Noon-3 PM on Sunday. If there is a problem with the unloading times, contact the 4-H Coordinator at the Extension Office. The 4-H Coordinator must approve all exceptions. All livestock will be weighed under the supervision of the 4-H Extension Educator and FFA Advisors. ALL ANIMALS MUST BE CLEAN AND PRESENTABLE BEFORE PENNING. ANIMALS MUST BE DRY UPON WEIGH-IN. Market hogs, goats, and lambs will be weighed at 4 PM on Sunday, July 27<sup>th</sup>. Dairy beef and market steers will be weighed at 3 PM on Monday, July, 28th.
- **5.** 4-H members must be enrolled in a 4-H project within the current year by June 1st.
- **6.** All 4-H/FFA exhibitors must have their project and record books up to date through July of the current year in order to exhibit or sell animals at the fair. 4-H club leaders and FFA Advisors will be responsible to check over the project and record books prior to fair week. If the project and record books are not up to date, the exhibitor will not show or sell. If an exhibitor is found not doing his/her own work or is allowing another person to do his/her work, the exhibitor will not be allowed to show or sell.
- 7. All livestock and dairy members must attend one ethics and quality assurance training annually whether it is in their project county or in another county prior to their Round-up each year. If the member does not, they may not exhibit that year. This is a state 4-H rule, not a county rule.
- 8. All livestock must show in order to sell at the sale Thursday night of fair week. If an animal cannot walk on its own free will through the sale, it may not be sold. If death occurs between show day and sale day, the animal or products of that animal may not be sold.
- 9. All overweight and underweight animals may not sell during the sale, but go for the packer price. If an exhibitor has an overweight or underweight animal, the exhibitor can either choose to take the animal home the night of weigh-in or show the animal in the showmanship and fitting divisions. The animal will not have a market division class and may not compete for champion or reserve. **There is an exception in the**

dairy beef show, please see the dairy beef section for showmanship and fitting division. However, upon weigh in at the fair, livestock (market steer, hot, goat, lamb and dairy beef) animals will be given a 5 pound weight allowance, under and over the minimum and maximum required weight. As for market meat pens of rabbits, they will be given a 4 oz. weight allowance per rabbit. The roaster rabbits will be given an 8 oz. weight allowance.

- 10. All livestock ear tags naming the farm, sale or origin in which the exhibitor purchased or bred the animal must be removed prior to July 1<sup>st</sup>. If an exhibitor needs an ear tag or questions this ruling, please contact the extension office for clarification and/or a tag.
- 11. A code of ethics is in place by the fair for all animal exhibitors. All exhibitors are required to sign the code of ethics and turn it in upon fair check-in. The form may be found in this fair book.
- 12. Dairy cattle will be released no earlier than <u>Saturday at 9 PM</u>. Livestock animals going to private buyers will be released between 9 AM and 2 PM on Saturday. Livestock animals sold to the packer will be loaded at 6 PM Saturday night.
- 13. There are three classes for livestock and dairy showmanship. Junior (8-12), Intermediate (13-15), and Senior (16 and up). It is mandatory for the exhibitor to show his/her own animal in the showmanship division. No substitutions will be permitted.
- 14. There are two fitting classes for livestock and dairy competition. Intermediate (13-15) and Senior (16 and up). Again this year, if you are between the ages of 8 and 12 (as of January 1st of the year) you will be competing in a "cleanliness" class for livestock and dairy. This class will not be judged on the fitting of the animal, but on how clean the animal is for show.
- 15. Livestock and Dairy members shall compete in all 4-H classes for which they are eligible, including fitting and showmanship.
- 16. 4-H members exhibiting breeding livestock (including dairy animals) may substitute an animal for an injured, ill, or dead animal if the animal to be substituted has been registered as a 4-H project animal no later than the animal species project deadline. All substitutions are due by July 11, 2014.
- 17. All animal not meeting class guidelines by weigh-in will be disqualified!
- 18. Clean your stall-Keep you cash! It is the responsibility of all exhibitors to clean away from the barn edges following the end of fair week. The Livestock and Dairy Superintendents will assess a \$50.00 fee to any exhibitor who does not clean out their area appropriately. Exhibitors are asked to clean three feet (3') away from the outside barn boards and stack your animal pens before leaving. It takes everyone working together to have a successful fair-thanks for doing your part!
- 19. Pass Policy: Each Livestock/Dairy exhibitor will be issued 1 exhibitor pass/wristband with 2

additional exhibitor passes/wristbands per family and 2 parking passes per family. Additional passes can be purchased at the Fair office at the cost of \$5 per week for a person pass and \$10 per week for a parking pass. Holders of livestock passes will be admitted ONLY through the livestock gate. Livestock passes must be in the Exhibitor or Exhibitor's helper's possession at all times. Superintendents and Fair board members have a right to ask to see the pass. This is a request from security to protect our 4-H/FFA and Open Exhibitors. All occupants of a vehicle entering through the livestock gate must have personal Livestock passes/wristbands plus a vehicle pass. All Livestock exhibitor vehicles will be requested to park in the livestock parking area.

Do not expect bedding to be provided. Exhibitor should expect to furnish grain, hay, bedding, and care for animal.

# SECTION 1 COUNTY ROUND-UP 4-H HORSE SHOW

- 1. Rules are the same as found in the Pennsylvania State 4-H Horse Show Rule Book.
- 2. The horse show is scheduled for <u>Saturday</u>, <u>July 26, 2014</u>. The show will begin at 9:00 A.M.
- **3.** Only current members of a Schuylkill County 4-H Horse Club will be eligible to stable a horse at the fair. Each member may bring only the horse or pony that is registered with the extension office as his/her 4-H project animal for the current year. All exceptions will be determined by the extension educator and horse advisory board prior to round-up.
- **4.** Contact the Extension Office for official equine health rules in order to exhibit at round-up and the fair
- 5. Members must pre-register for classes with the extension office by June 1. See club leaders or the extension office for entry forms. Members may drop a class at the show, but they may not add a class. All members must register for a showmanship and grooming class! Note: 4-H Member Age Divisions for Horse Class: Junior Division-member who has not reached his/her 14th birthday by Jan. 1st of the current year. Senior Division- member who is 14 years old or over by Jan. 1st of the current year. Age on Jan. 1st of current year determines Grooming and Showmanship class.

# SECTION 2 DAIRY CATTLE

- 1. Rules are the same as found in Department 2 Dairy Cattle, in addition to allowing up to two entries per class EXCEPT for group classes. If an exhibitor has more than one entry, it is his/her responsibility to find a substitute showman. The showman must be the same age as the exhibitor or younger.
- 2. Dairy animals will be released Saturday at 9 PM.
- **3.** HEALTH REQUIREMENTS are located in the front of the book.
- 4. The dairy show is scheduled for Thursday, July 31,

- 2014. The show will begin at 9:00 A.M. beginning with Senior Showmanship followed by Intermediate and Junior Showmanship. The milking classes will begin at approximately 10:30 A.M.
- 5. Show order for 2014, should we have all these breeds: Jersey, Ayrshire, Lineback, Brown Swiss, Holstein, Guernsey, Milking Shorthorn and Red & White.
- **6.** For complete project rules and requirements, participants may contact their club leader or the extension office
- **7.** Jr. Best 3 Female Fall Yearling and Under consists of three females that fit this age category. All animals must be registered under the same farm prefix. At least one owned by the exhibitor.
- **8.** Best 3 Females consists of any aged females. All animals must be registered under the same farm prefix. At least one owned by the exhibitor.
- 9. Fill out the 4-H/FFA dairy entry form ONLY for 4-H and FFA. Fill out the open form ONLY for open classes! These two forms are mailed to different addresses. DO NOT fill out the livestock/general entry form for dairy animals as they will NOT be registered!

- **8.** Calf must be of one (1) dairy breed- crossbreds of dairy or meat breeds aren't allowed.
- **9.** It is strongly recommended but not required that Holstein calves rather than smaller dairy breeds be used
- 10. Show day is Wednesday, July 30 at 11 AM.
- **11.** The dairy beef project is to be raised, shown, and fitted as a beef animal, not a dairy animal. This is a beef project.
- 12. The member is to be caring and fitting his/her animal for the duration of the project. Limited assistance will be permitted. Showmanship age divisions are as follows: Junior (8-12), Intermediate (13-15) and Senior (16-up). Fitting age divisions are as follows: Junior/Cleanliness Award-not fitting class (8-12), Intermediate fitting (13-15) and Senior fitting (16-up).
  - A. Due to large numbers of dairy beef, there will be two dairy beef judges (a type and a showmanship/fitting judge). The judges will judge simultaneous with the exhibitors showing to the type judge. The show and fit judge will determine which exhibitors will come back in for placement in their respective age categories prior to the selection of champion.
  - B. Underweight dairy beef will be shown in their own showmanship and fitting class prior to the first weight division. Should the show/fit judge choose for them to come back, they will come back with the rest of the

# The Criteria for Judging the Pet class is as follows:

 Youngster must bring animal to show table and handle animal. The judge will observe the animal and owner interaction. A pet will be used to being handled and the exhibitor should handle the animal in the normal manner-I.e. depending on size of exhibitor and animal, animal should be carried similar to a foot ball

- with feet supported and head tucked under arm. Temperament of animal evaluated. 25 points
- Condition of animal-Fur is not matted; mange, dirty, excessively stained, Flesh-good flesh, not skin and bone, and animal looks fed and watered properly. No disease, wounds/sores, Snuffles, wolf teeth, tumors or abscesses or physical deformities 50 points
- 3. Exhibitor will be asked-age, gender, possible breed identification and variety of the animal. Note: A tie breaker will use the answer the exhibitor gives for the possible breed identification for any ties in the pet class. 20 points
- 4. Tie breaker-The answer given by the exhibitor to the judge about the possible breed and variety will be used by the judge to see how closely the animal meets the standard as per *The Standards of Perfection*. The animal closest to standard has higher score. Any ties will use this criterion. 5 points
- 5. Showmanship for Rabbits and cavies will use PASRBA materials and criteria form given to participants before the exhibitor is judge.

# SECTION 8B MASTER LIVESTOCK SHOWMAN CONTEST

The master livestock showman contest is to establish a master showman of livestock.

- Open to all 1<sup>st</sup> place showmen in each age division (junior, intermediate and senior) of the following species: market sheep, market goats, dairy beef, market steers, market hogs and dairy cattle.
- 2. If an exhibitor places first in showmanship in more than one species, the showman must decide which specie he/she would like to represent. Once the showman has selected the species, the 2<sup>nd</sup> place exhibitor of the non-selected species is then eligible to compete.

- 10. Chickens are to be hatched between March 1<sup>st</sup> and May 20<sup>th</sup> of the project year and in member's possession by May 20<sup>th</sup>.
- 11. Any contingency that may arise and is not covered by these rules will be adjusted by the Poultry Superintendent and 4-H Educator.
- 12. The poultry show is scheduled for 10 AM on Friday, August 1<sup>st</sup>.
- 13.HEALTH REQUIREMENTS all requirements are located in the front of the fair book and shall apply.
- 14 Exhibitors must sign the Animal Owner of Caretaker's Verification of Veterinarian-Client-Patient Relationship (VCPR) statement located on the bottom of the registration form.

# Section 1 WINES

1. Wines entered for competition in Department 21 must be amateur wine, home produced under regulations of part 540 of the Code of Federal Regulations. No entrant shall be involved with commercial winemaking or use the facilities or products of a commercial winery during any stage of wine preparation and/or storage of the wine.

#### This is an amateur contest.

- 2. An amateur winemaker makes wine either alone or in collaboration with other amateur winemakers. If there is collaboration, all persons involved must be named on the entry form and are considered one entrant. Only one entry (one bottle) per class per entrant. Entries may be distributed among the classes at the discretion of the winemaker or superintendent(s) of Department 21.
- 3. Wines registered and entered for competition in Department 21 will be delivered in accordance with the general rules of the Fair.
- 4. All wines will be evaluated by a competent judge(s) and will be placed within a class position. Decisions

rendered by the head judge will be final.

- 5. All wines must be produced and bottled by the entrant. Wines produced and bottled may be from any years' grapes, fruit, honey, or other fermentable. **No concentrates or fruit juices.**
- 6. All wines must be in standard 750 ml. Burgundy, Bordeaux, or Rhine shaped bottles. Screw capped bottles are permitted but will not be accepted if sealed with a cork. Sparkling wines will only be accepted if contained in standard 750 ml. Champagne-type bottle and sealed with a cork or plastic closure secured with the proper safety wire, or a crown cap. Ports and Sherries may be entered in Fortified wine bottles with "T" corks
- 7. All bottles entered must be labeled as follows: (typed or printed)
  - year of fermentation
  - name of wine (if applicable)
  - name(s) of grape(s), fruit(s), honey, or other fermentable
  - if blend, approximate percentage of components

NO ENTRANT NAME IS TO BE PLACED ON THE LABEL. THIS IS TO ENSURE FAIRNESS IN JUDGING.

- 8. Breakage due to incomplete fermentation will not be the responsibility of the Fair.
- 9.The same vintage may not be entered in subsequent vears.
- 10.All wines will be judged according to their relative merits within the category. The "Best of Show" winner will be that wine which is clearly superior in its category and has an overall enological excellence that surpasses all other wines in the competition.
- 11.The Superintendent(s) reserves the right to interpret the rules as required for the best interest of the competition.

#### WINE CLASSIFICATION

Classes are primarily divided between DRY (or) SEMISWEET and SWEET. The sugar content of dry or semisweet wines must not exceed 3% while those wines with higher sugar content must be classified as sweet.

Tractors – Tractors must be model year 1959 or earlier and be wheel driven by the rear wheels only to participate in the antique tractor pull.

Inspection – Tractors will be subject to inspection at any time by the pull committee. Any tractors judged to be unsafe or in violation of the rules will not be allowed to participate in the pull.

Drawbar – The drawbar must be original or match factory specs with a maximum height of 18". The length of the drawbar must be no less than 24" from the center of the rear axle to the hook point. Drawbar must remain stationary in all directions during pull. Must use flat plate with 3" hole or twisted clevis only. Farmall tractors must pull from original drawbar hooked to the original belly hook point.

Weights - Weights may be added to make weight classes.

Tires and Rims – Rim diameters may not be larger than factory specs. Pressed steel (tin) wheels allowed on all tractors. Maximum tire size for any class is: 20.8-38. Tires cannot measure more than 21 inches across tread. No duals are allowed. CUT TIRES ALLOWED IN OPEN CLASS ONLY!

R.P.M. – A maximum of 10% over factory specs only – subject to check at any time. No duplex carburetors allowed on JD letter series tractors except in open class. Classes – A tractor may pull in two classes, BUT ONLY ONCE IN EACH CLASS. This may be changed at drivers meeting depending on tractor count/weather. Anyone may pull in the 10,500 open class in addition to the two regular classes.

Antique Open – The maximum drawbar height will be 20" with a minimum drawbar length of 18" from the center of the axle to hook point. Cut tires allowed in open class only.

Classic-1960 to 1972 Factory turbos allowed. All antique rules apply.

Modern Stock – 1973 to Present Factory turbos allowed. All antique rules apply.

#### PULLING COMPETITION RULES

- 1. All drivers must be 16 years of age or older verified by driver's license.
- 2. Only driver allowed on tractor. No riders!
- 3. Tractors must be registered at least one hour prior to the pull.
- The PULL COMMITTEE will hold a safety and procedures meeting prior to the start of the pull. ALL drivers must attend.
- 5. Tractors must be operated in a safe manner AT ALL TIMES. Speed must not exceed 3 mph on or off the track
- 6. The order of pull will be determined by drawing at time of sign in.
- 7. The sled operator has the option to recall the first pull in each class for sled adjustments. The first puller in each class has the option to accept or decline the pull. This decision must be made immediately at the end of the first pull.
- 8. The driver must start with a tight chain and only after flagman displays the green flag. Anyone not starting with a tight chain will be disqualified.
- 9. Speed must be controlled by a hand throttle only. Strings and wires are not allowed. Foot throttles allowed if original factory equipment.
- 10. Drivers must remain seated and be in full control of the tractor at all times.
- 11. Tractors losing weights or any other objects while hooked to the sled will be disqualified.

- 12. Tractors must stay within the pulling track boundaries during the pull. Neither the tractor nor the sled may contact the barriers at any time.
- 13. If a tractor stops or stalls before the sled passes the 40 foot mark, the driver has the option of restarting the pull or dropping to the end of the class. Sled and tractor will be pulled back to start point. Full pull line for the sled will be marked at the end of the track.
- 14. All tractors must stop pulling upon the RED flag signal from the Flagman.
- 15. In the event of cancellation, refunds for any incomplete pulls may be requested up to 30 minutes after cancellation. Otherwise all hook fees will be donated to the Ag Museum.

#### General Rules

- 1. All vehicles must be attended to while running.
- 2. All competitors must wear a seatbelt or an approved harness while competing.
- 3. All drivers must possess a valid driver's license or have prior approval from association.
- 4. All vehicles must contain a minimum of a 1 lb. dry charge fire extinguisher.
- 5. All modified drivers must wear a DOT approved helmet.
- 6. Competing vehicle may not contain any

passenger while on track. DRIVER ONLY!

- 7. No consumption of alcohol before or during event by driver or crew member.
- 8. All drivers and crew members must sign waiver stating they are competing at their own risk and will not hold any official, promoter, or track owner liable for any reason.
- 9. All vehicles must be operated in a safe manner at all times. A five mile per hour speed limit is imposed at all times while on the grounds.
- 10. Officials reserve the right to change any rule at any time when the primary concern is the safety of the participants(s) and or spectators.
- 11. All vehicles must drive onto the track, compete, and leave track under its own power unless breakage occurs.
- 12. Puller is allowed second attempt if first attempt does not exceed 75 foot mark.
- 13. Test puller may drop their first pull and drop back to the sixth position. If test puller drops first run he/she must take their second attempt.

#### 14. ABSOLUTELY NO COMBUSTION

**ACCELERATORS ALLOWED.** Examples are as follows: nitrous and propane

- 15. All pulls must start with a tight chain. No shifting standard transmissions and no jerking the sled.
- 16. All vehicles are subject to technical inspection before any event and at any time during an event as seen fit by an official.
- 17. No fuel tanks or batteries allowed in cab of truck unless factory installed.
- 18. Hitches will be of sturdy construction with a minimum 3 inch diameter hole at hook point. Hitch will be horizontal to the ground. Hook point may not be more than 26 inches from the ground. (Hitches will be covered in greater detail in each set of class rules.)
- 19. Engine must be located in factory location.
- 20. All tires must be DOT approved with no modification to the tire such as cutting, grooving, paddles, chains, studs, etc.
- 21. A driver will be disqualified for losing any weights and will lose any points for that class. All weights must be secured on a weight rack or in the bed of the truck. No weight in the cab.
- 22. All trucks must be composed of 1 ton or smaller frame. Flat beds are permitted.
- 23. If there are not enough trucks to fill a class we may combine classes. For example if there are only two or three trucks for the classic gas then they will be asked to run with the stock class.
- 24. Hand throttles and relocation of parts such as moving the radiator to the bed etc.... allowed in all classes except stock classes.
- 25. If 10% over stock rpm's must have a scatter blanket.

- 5. All Factory body panels must be in place. This includes a full floor to support the factory payload. You may trim the front fenders and remove front wheel wells for tire clearance. If any interior is removed to make weight, no ballast may be placed anywhere on the vehicle.
- 6. All factory glass must be in place.
- 7. Must pull off or a Reese style hitch, bolted to the bottom of the frame rail. Hook point must be rigid in all directions with a minimum 3 ¾ inch hole for hook. Hitch must be horizontal to the ground and the hook may not exceed 26 inches in height. Hook point must be the furthest point on the back of the truck.
- 8. A minimum of 1 inch of suspension travel required. If airbags are installed they cannot be a live system, lines must be unhooked.

- 11. One drive shaft loop must be installed on any drive shaft over 36 inches long including those with a carrier bearing.
- 12. All trucks must have all hubs covered. Covers don't have to be solid, but must be able to contain parts should breakage occur.
- 13.No injection of combustion accelerators permitted. Examples are nitrous and propane.
- 14. D.O.T. approved tires only can in be offset stance.

#### **Work Stock Diesel**

- 1.Truck eligible with a stock OEM Turbo. No wheel or internal changes allowed to turbo. Turbo will be checked so all drivers need to prepare to expose inlet.
- 2.Maximum weight of 8500 lbs.
- 3. All Trucks must have a minimum of 1 lb. dry charge fire extinguisher mounted within drivers reach.
- 4.No excessive spooling on line. When the green flag comes out and you touch the throttle you have 5 seconds from that point to leave the start line.

- 7. No tube chassis allowed. Must be 1 ton or smaller stock production from front axle to the rear most point of the frame.
- 8. No injection of combustion accelerators permitted. Examples: nitrous and propane.
- 9. Must be a one ton or smaller driveline.
- 10.DOT approved tires with no modifications only.

- 2. Suspension may be welded solid. This is an open driveline class.
- 3. 3.0 and under single turbo allowed.
- 4. Hitch must be of solid construction and rigid in all directions, draw bar style permitted, hook point must have 3 ¾ inch diameter hole. Hook point cannot be more than 26 inches from the ground, and cannot extend more than 6 inches under the truck. Centerline of rear

axle to hook point must be a minimum of 25% of the vehicle's wheelbase.

- 6. Must have operational kill switch mounted within 18 inches of hook point.





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

#### EXHIBITOR'S GOOD CONDUCT POLICY AND CODE OF SHOW RING ETHICS

#### **Good Conduct Policy**

All exhibitors are expected to conduct themselves in a cooperative and courteous manner while participating in events at the Schuylkill County Fair. Exhibitors who wish to have the privilege of participating in activities at the Schuylkill County Fair must conduct themselves in accordance with the Good Conduct Policy. Use or possession of alcoholic beverages, tobacco or illegal drugs by any exhibitor, regardless of age, on the Schuylkill County Fairgrounds (barns, exhibiting facilities, dormitories, campgrounds, etc.) will result in the following:

- A. If the violation occurs before or during exhibition, the exhibitor is ineligible to participate in activities at the Schuylkill County Fair and must remove his / her exhibit (s) from the Fairgrounds.
- B. If the violation occurs after exhibiting, the exhibitor forfeits his / her premium money, prize money, trophies / banners and / or sale of champions money, and must remove his / her exhibit (s) from the Fairgrounds.
- C. The violation may be reported to: Law enforcement authorities and a responsible advisor of the 4-H / FFA Program.
- D. A meeting of the exhibitor parent, responsible advisor (if applicable) and Schuylkill County Fair officials will be held to determine future exhibitor eligibility.

#### **Code of Show Ring Ethics**

Exhibitors of animals at the Schuylkill County Fair shall at all times deport themselves with honesty and good sportsmanship. Their conduct in this competitive environment shall always reflect the highest standards of honor and dignity in the advancement of agriculture education. This code applies to junior as well as open class exhibitors at the Schuylkill County Fair. This code applies to all livestock offered in any event at a livestock show.

All Youth leaders working with junior exhibitors are under an affirmative responsibility to do more than avoid improper conduct or questionable acts. Their moral values must be so certain and positive that those younger and more pliable will be influenced by their fine example. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers and absolutely responsible persons who violate the code of ethics will forfeit premiums, awards and auction proceeds and shall be prohibited from future exhibition in accordance with the rules adopted by the respective fairs and livestock shows.

The following is a list of guidelines for all exhibitors and all livestock in competitive events:

- 1. All exhibitors must present, upon request of the Schuylkill County Fair and livestock show officials, proof of ownership, length of ownership and age of all animals entered. Misrepresentation of ownership, age, or any facts relating thereto is prohibited.
- 2. Owners, exhibitors, fitters, trainers or absolutely responsible persons shall provide animal health certificates from licensed veterinarians upon request by fair or livestock show officials.
- 3. Junior exhibitors are expected to care for and groom their animals while at the Schuylkill County Fair.
- 4. All food animals that may be harvested immediately following the show shall be safe for consumers, and shall have met all withdrawal times for all medications, and be free of violative drug residue.


If any animal requires medical treatment while at the Fair, only a Certified Veterinarian may administer the treatment unless directed by the Certified Veterinarian. All medications that are administered shall be done according to the label instructions of the medication used.

By entering an animal in this Fair, I am giving consent to the Management of the Schuylkill County Fair to obtain any species of urine, saliva, blood or other substances from the animal to be used in testing. If the laboratory report on the analysis of any sample indicates a presence of forbidden drugs, this shall be evidence such substance has been administered to the animal(s) either internally or externally. It is presumed that the sample tested by the laboratory to which it is sent is the one taken from the animal in question, its integrity is preserved and all procedures of said collection and preservation, transfer to the laboratory and analysis of the sample are correct and accurate and the report received from the laboratory pertains to the sample taken from the animal in question and correctly reflects the condition of the animal at the time the sample was taken, with the burden on me, my parent (s) and/or guardian (if applicable) to prove otherwise.

- 5. Any Surgical procedure or injection of any foreign substance or drug or the external application of any substance (irritant, counterirritant, or similar substance) which could affect the animal's performance or alter its natural contour, confirmation, or appearance, except external applications of substances to the hoofs or horns of animals which affect appearance only and except for the surgical procedures performed by a duly licensed veterinarian for the sole purpose of protecting the health of the animal, is prohibited.
- 6. The use of showing and / or handling practices or devices such as striking animals to cause swelling, using electrical contrivance, or other similar practices are not acceptable and are prohibited.
- 7. Direct criticism or interference with the judge, fair or livestock show management, other exhibitors, breed representatives, or show officials before, during or after the competitive event is prohibited. In the furtherance of their official duty, all judges, fair and livestock show management, or other show officials shall be treated with courtesy, cooperation and respect and no person shall direct abusive or threatening conduct toward them.
- 8. No owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer or absolutely responsible person shall conspire with another person or persons to intentionally violate this code of ethics or knowingly contribute or cooperate with another person or persons either by affirmative action or inaction to violate this code of ethics. Violation of this rule shall subject such individual to disciplinary action
- 9. The application of this code of ethics provides for absolute responsibility for an animal's condition by an owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer or participant whether or not he or she was actually instrumental in or had actual knowledge of the treatment of the animal in contravention of this code of ethics.
- 10. The act of entering an animal is the giving of consent by the owner, exhibitor, fitter, trainer or absolutely responsible person to have disciplinary action taken by the fair or livestock show for violation of this Code of Show Ring Ethics and any other rules of competition of the fair or livestock show without recourse against the fair or livestock show.
- 11. I am responsible for my exhibit and I will not allow others to violate this Code on my behalf. By my entering an exhibit in this fair I will accept any disciplinary action taken by the Management of the Schuylkill County Fair for any violation of this Code of Ethics and any other rules of competition of the Fair without recourse against the Schuylkill County Fair.
- 12. I want my exhibit to be an example of how to accept what life has to offer both good and not so good, and how to live with and learn from the outcome.
- 13. I will not be involved in any illegal activities while participating in the Schuylkill County Fair, including but not limited to alcohol, tobacco or drug use.

I agree to conduct myself in an honest, ethical and upstanding manner; and I understand that disciplinary actions will result if these rules are violated. I understand that I am expected to represent myself in a positive manner. I certify that these entries are from my project and I maintain records on them. While participating in events at the Schuylkill County Fair, I will conduct myself in a cooperative and courteous manner. I have read, understand and agree to follow this Exhibitor Good Conduct Policy and Code of Show Ring Ethics and agree to abide by them.
